To Larry Hecker, Chairman of the Pima County Bond Commission


Dear Larry,

Attached are letters delivered to the Board of Supervisors and Chuck Huckelberry on March 9, 2015. An attempt is being made to spend more than \$2,000,000.00 of Bond Money to tear down the west side barns which would terminate horse racing. They intend to build three soccer fields. The money is being taken from the Bond approved for the Northwest Community Park. The same amount of money could be used to build up to 20 soccer fields NOW at another location.

My concern is that our campaign to save the Rillito Racetrack National Historic Site and horse racing may result in negative publicity about the use of Pima County Bond money. That could harm future bond elections. It is obvious that there is a group trying to terminate horse racing and take over the Rillito Racetrack for their economic benefit.

SUBJECT:

The use of bond money that the voters approved for a different purpose to tear down part of a National Historic District and possibly terminate horse racing in Pima County.

To the Pima County Board of Supervisors,

Historic Rillito Racetrack, Inc. paid the cost and got Rillito Racetrack listed as a NATIONAL HISTORIC SITE. It is the birthplace in our country of Quarter Horse racing and of the internationally recognized University of Arizona Race Track Management Program. The Arizona State Historic Preservation Officer, Mr. Garrison, stated that Pima County, as owner of the west side barns on the property, could tear them down even though it would detract from the historic value. We do not think that it benefits the tax payers to spend millions of dollars to tear down historic barns to build three soccer fields. The same money could build up to 20 soccer fields on land already owned, and would be available to children and adults, not just those who are mostly paying clients of one soccer organization. The tearing down of those barns may compromise and terminate horse racing in Pima County. Rillito Park horse racing is a business that attracts thousands of spectators and provides jobs for hundreds of people. The economic impact of the Rillito Racetrack provides millions of dollars to our community every year.

A separate letter is attached to Chuck Huckelberry detailing the steps we contemplate taking to protect this historic site and provide many more soccer fields NOW without harming our National Historic Site. Make more soccer fields available for Tucson citizens on government land in the Tucson area. You can save our historic site for an industry that provides jobs and entertainment for thousands of locals and winter visitors.



Dear Chuck,

You recognized the legality in your recent comments about the use of Pima County Bond Money on Broadway, that the money could only be used for what the voters had approved. The proposal to spend money to tear down the historic barns at Rillito Racetrack from bond money originally approved as part of a 5.5 million dollar bond issue for a totally different use violates the State Constitution as determined by the Supreme Court in 2013. The Rillito Racetrack Ordinance Initiative was approved by an overwhelming majority of voters in 1984. It had more than one purpose. It was an ordinance that required the preservation of historic improvements at the Rillito Racetrack and to support the historic preservation of the improvements. As you know Mo Udall suggested the Initiative and some of its language, and was the first person to sign it. We would respectfully request that Pima County not take action on approving the contract in tomorrow's agenda to tear down the barns.

We would include the Initiative Ordinance in any legal action to preserve the barns and horse racing. Other than this issue, we think Pima County has benefitted our community in the manner in which they have protected soccer and horse racing.
